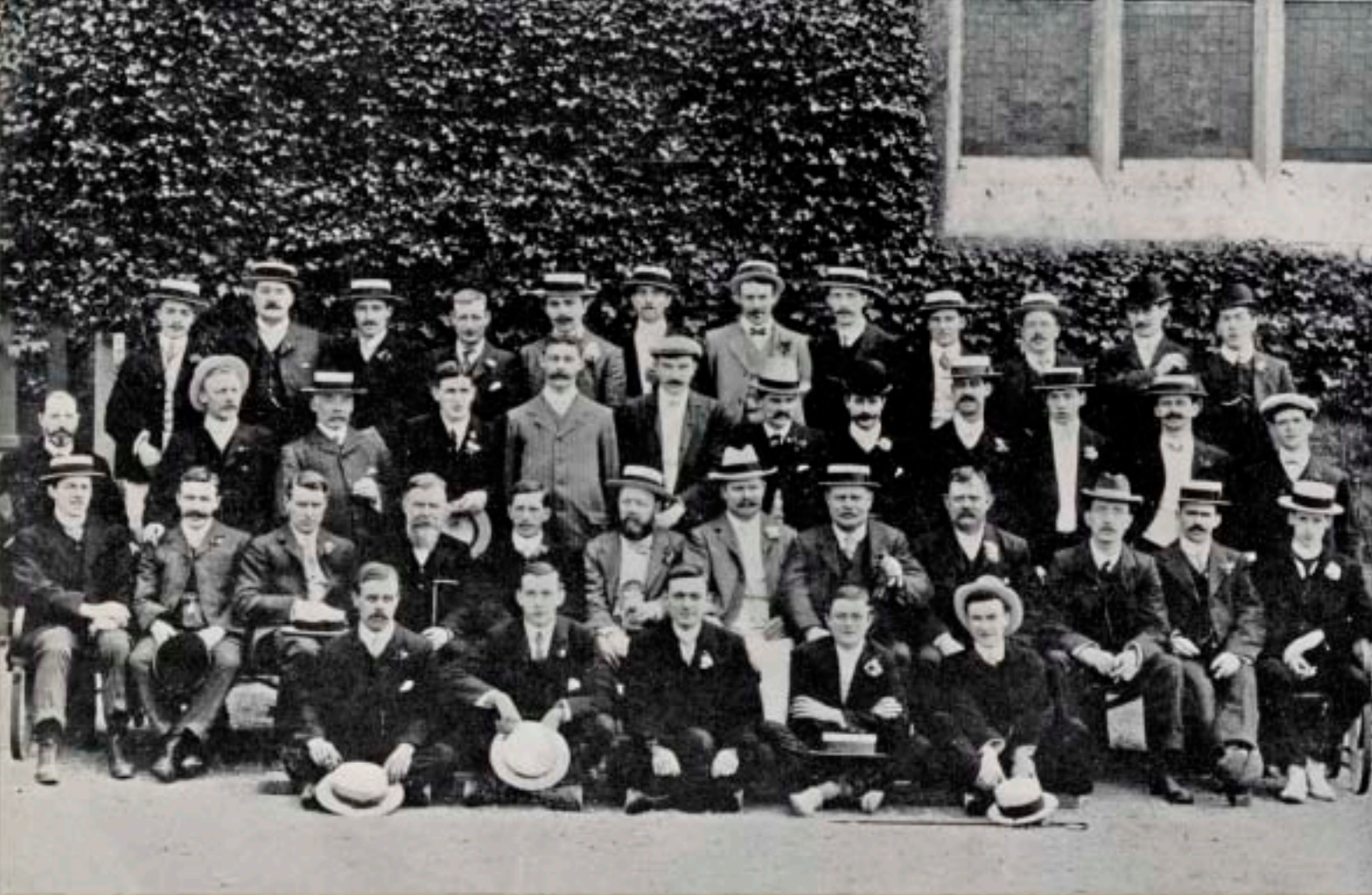


## SOME EARLY HISTORY

When Frederick Topham added his name to the loyal address to the late King Edward VII on the completion of the Victoria and Albert Museum during 1909 he did so as the Engineer employed by T. Clarke & Co. Ltd., for they were responsible for the electrical installation. It was probable in those days, that the future of the steelworker and the bricklayer, the carpenter and the painter, was thought to be brighter than that of the electrician. The years that have passed between then and now, however, have proved to be Electrical Years and, today, the skill of the electrical engineer enters into almost every phase of modern life. The original office of T. Clarke & Co., was at 156 Sloane Street, S.W. The staff was small:

together with wiremen and shop boys. In June 1895, the Company moved to 4 Seymour Street, where it remained about seven years. Later, the Stores were moved to the basement of the

building on the site now occupied by William Willett Ltd., Sloane Square, and then were again moved to 237 Pavilion Road, S.W.1, where they remain until today. In 1902 the Company moved its general office from Seymour Street to its present address at 129 Sloane Street, S.W.1.

These signs of progressive development were the result of considerable expansion in the Company's activities and, as will be shown, the early successes were carried on by men of great experience, whose initiative and enterprise are some of the reasons why T. Clarke & Co., Ltd., now enjoy the confidence of many important organisations at Home and Overseas.

Thomas Clarke died on holiday in 1911, and T. Clarke & Co. became a limited company that year. The Directors were:

It was found convenient to study, in the pages that follow, the activities of the Company in three stages—1889 until 1914, 1915 until 1939, and 1940 until 1953.

During the years of War and Peace the Company placed its resources unreservedly at the disposal of the Country.

## 1889 — 1914

Electrical Contracting in 1889 was closely associated with the building industry, for the days of electrical power supply were then only just beginning. The electrical installations for buildings were usually confined to lighting, and sometimes the supply of private generating plant increased the scope of the contract and the Company's work.

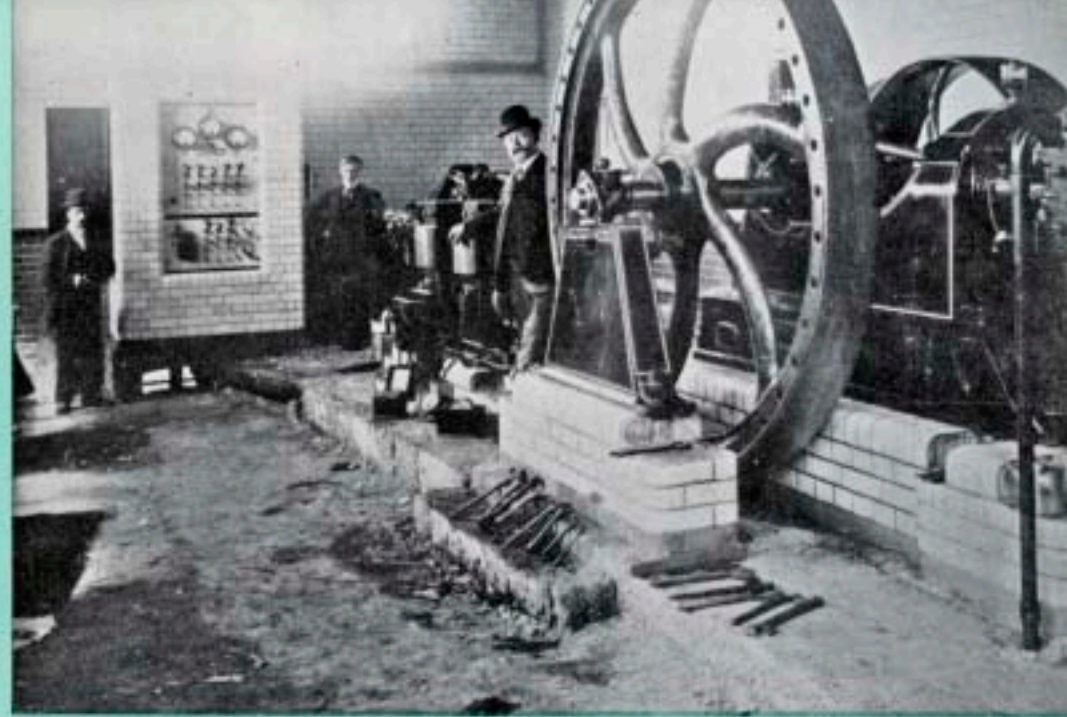
William Willett & Co., who today still occupy their original premises at Sloane Square, are Builders and one of the Company's early customers. In 1890 there was considerable electrical work to be done for them in country houses and in the West End of London, at Hampstead, at Chislehurst, and in fashionable Mayfair and Belgravia.



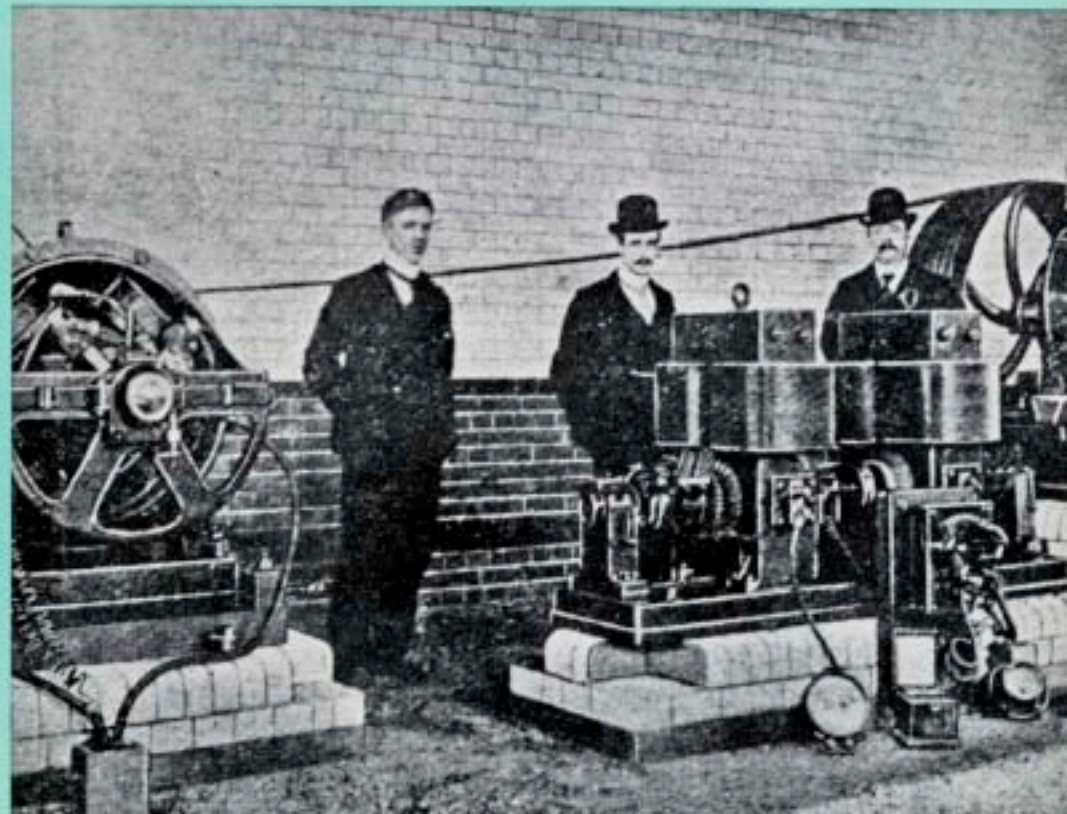


It was in 1890 that T. Clarke & Co. offered to its customers "the wires encased in fire-proof material", and the fire-preventing qualities had a great appeal. The innovation became very popular.

The electrical installation of the Royal Victoria and Albert Museum was one of the largest of its kind in the Country, and, as has been said, it was carried out by the engineers and wiremen of the Company. It is interesting to recall that the work was done in sections, part capping and casing, part in steel conduit — the

latter was then considered to be a large installation, using that material. This type of work was proceeding at the time of the transition from steam to electric power. As the demand for Electricity grew, the Company's goodwill grew with it, and orders were received from the Ministry of Works for installations at Windsor Castle, St. James's Palace, The Tower of London, and the National Portrait Gallery. Much important work was done for the War Office, and the demand for installations in historical and notable country houses made this type of contract an increasingly important part of the Company's programme. It was privileged to install electricity at:—

Ribsdon Park for H.R.H. Princess Louise,

Bagshot Park for H.R.H. The Duke of Connaught,

Yewhurst, for Sir Abe Bailey,

and the Town Houses for H.R.H. The  
Duke of Connaught, The Marquis of  
Bath, The Marquis of Cadogan, Field  
Marshal Lord Grenfell, Lord Harcourt,  
Lord Willingdon, and the former Viceroy  
of India.

And so from the beginnings of a pioneer  
in 1889, an organisation grew, worthy of  
the important work entrusted to it.

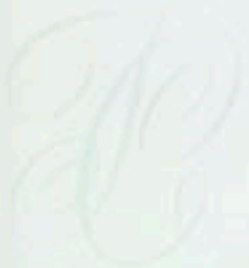

## 1915-1939

The increase in the demand and use of electricity as the result of the first world war, was reflected in the growth and prosperity of the Company. Much important work had been done and as each contract was brought to a desirable conclusion, the confidence of Consulting Engineers, Industry and Government Departments was gained. Increasing demands were made on a growing staff, and new engineers and wiremen were employed, additional drawing office and estimating sections became necessary—a trend that continued and still remains unsatisfied.

With the coming of peace, despite disappointing trade recession in many industries, the demand for electricity continued to grow. The Central Electricity Board and the National Grid made current available to many thousands, automatically increasing the demand for the equipment necessary to generate, transmit and distribute current, and for the industrial and domestic appliances that consumed electricity once it was provided, and a suitable installation made.

In these circumstances, T. Clarke & Co., Ltd., continued to develop and improve the prominent position already secured for itself in the Electrical Industry.

Good workmanship and efficient organisation were expected of them, and contracts demanding the highest standards were awarded to them. To mention them all would become monotonous, but some should be included in this publication. The electrical installations for :-

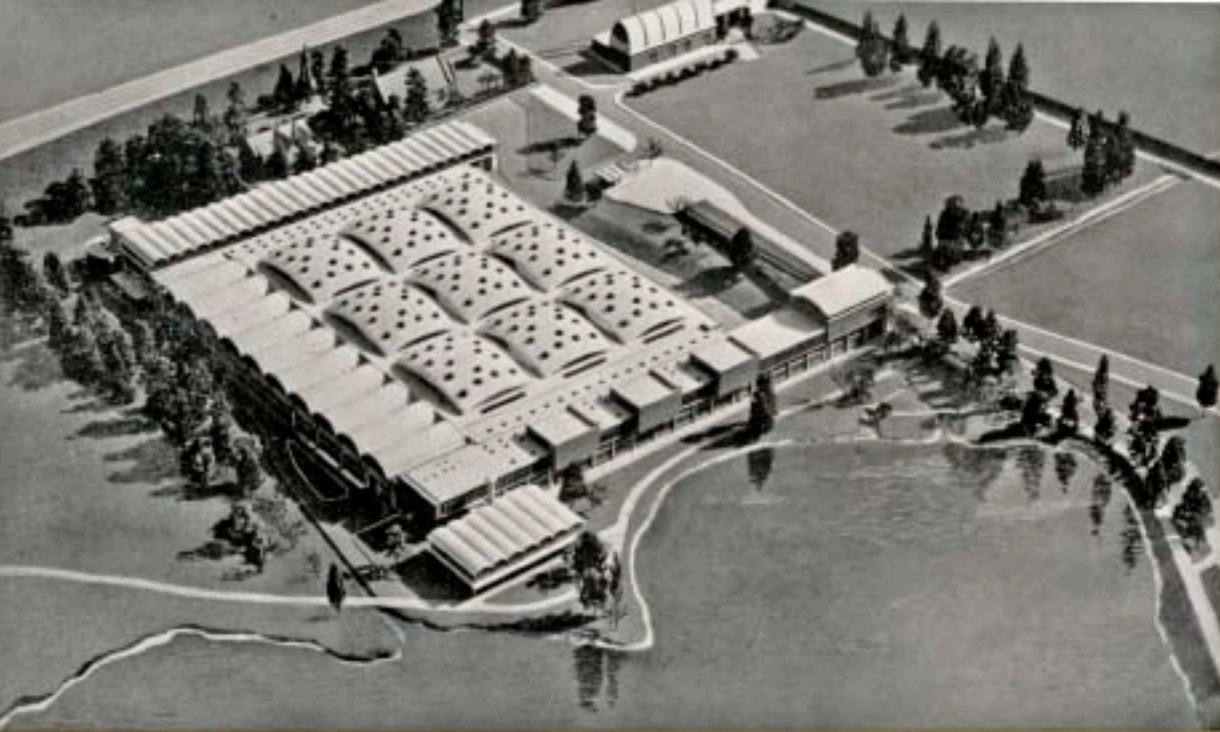

## 1940-1953

As leading Electrical Engineers and Contractors, the Company made an outstanding contribution to the Country's war effort. The Admiralty, The War Office, The Air Ministry, The Office of Works all used its services during the second world war. Contracts of the highest importance were undertaken.

In 1946 and the year that followed, the Company paid more and more attention to the growing demand for electricity overseas, and special arrangements were made to obtain first-hand information of the work to be done, and when this was obtained, to see that careful—yet competitive—tenders were submitted. These activities called for the urgent attention of the Company's senior executives, and it can be recorded that since 1950, one or other of the Company's Directors or senior engineers has always been either overseas, just returning, or about to commence another journey to secure new markets.
